600 Does Your Club Have the Key Ingredients? A

As 4-H volunteers and professionals, we know 4-H helps youth grow and develop in positive ways. We hear it in the 4-H pledge and work hard to give youth the best experience possible. Recent research shows that, when certain elements are present, 4-H meets the needs of young people and builds positive characteristics commonly known as the “5 Cs”: competence, connection, confidence, character, and caring. The Eight Essential Elements are the key ingredients for developing the 5Cs in our 4-H members. Through a presentation and interactive discussion, participants in this session will: (1) learn about the eight elements, (2) practice using a survey to assess a club’s use of the elements, (3) brainstorm ways to improve, and (4) take home an action plan.  4-H members can and do want to complete their still projects. Adams County 4-H hosted a Kids College in spring 2011 that proved to be an effective stimulus for still project completion. Instructors volunteered their time to teach elective courses on such project-related topics as Cake Decorating 101, Advanced Scrapbooking, Basic Photography, and more. Required courses included Communications 101, Interviewing Basics, and 4-H Opportunities. Forty-four members attended, and these youth went on to complete more than 74% of their related still projects (as compared to an overall still project completion rate of less than 50%). When raising market beef, a BCS can assist in determining the best condition for the animal as harvest approaches. Identified changes can then be made in the current ration and the amount being fed. This session will train participants on when and how to body condition score and offer
